BRAG TO US ABOUT WHAT YOU DID THIS YEAR!

I used most of the scholarship money this year to buy practice books and online courses for my dental school exam. The rest of the money was used to support my daily expense.

HOW DID YOU USE YOUR SCHOLARSHIP MONEY?

I took a year off of school. I interned at Tesla as an engineer! Now I am an engineering manager for the Autopilot team. I also launched Kumoapp.com and started ivyhacks.comIt has been a very challenging school year this year. In late 2019, our college was impacted by PG&E power outages. Then, the world was hit by COVID-19, greatly impacting college activities. Finally, in June this year, the country was shocked by the racial injustice against George Floyd and many others.

Throughout this year, I was very active in the orchestra before the pandemic came to a halt. We were planning for a European trip during which we would perform at the Musikverein in Vienna. I was in charge of the publicity projects for our Crowdfunding campaign. Unfortunately, a lot of the efforts was eliminated by the COVID outbreak since we decided to cancel the trip. Nevertheless, we had some great concerts during fall 2019 and early March 2020. One of my favorite pieces that I played was Sibelius' Symphony No. 2, a magnificent piece which the composer himself describes as "a confession of the soul." This fall semester, my orchestra will continue providing me Percussion and Timpani lessons via Zoom. They will try their best to arrange a practice room for me to practice.

During the last school year, I had much joy taking courses in both the Molecular and Cell Biology department and the College of Chemistry. Notably, I especially enjoyed learning biophysics and biophysical chemistry with Professor John Kuriyan. After taking the course, I accepted Prof. Kuriyan's offer to first serve as a tutor and now as one of the four head tutors for his undergrad biophysics course. Through this opportunity, I can not only give back to the Berkeley community by assisting those who needed it in the course but also enhance my knowledge. Furthermore, I continued as a volunteering Teacher-Scholar for the undergrad organic chemistry course. During this process, I have learned so much from the course instructor Dr. Robak, especially the skills to effectively pass on knowledge to others through encouraging teaching tactics. She is a professor that cares about the success of her students. I am inspired since this could be very important for future health care providers like me when it comes to the education and training of their staff.

Speaking of becoming a future health care provider, I had some quite fascinating experience since the last fall. I went through a rigorous selection process and became a volunteer at the Berkeley Free Clinic Dental Section. My cohort of new volunteers went through a six-month training, six hours every Saturday and Sunday (except holidays) in addition to our regular shift, one day per week, starting from 6 pm to 10 pm. When there are challenging procedures, we sometimes stay until midnight. Our dental clinic provides free general dentistry services to people who need it in the Berkeley and greater Bay Area. All clinic operations are supported completely by grants and donations. I am proud of what I do here, and I am very sure that I will work harder to become a future dentist, just like those who volunteer at our clinic, giving back to the community.



Currently, our clinic is still waiting for some donations to arrive in support of our reopening for urgent cases. It worries me every day before we can safely reopen since there are many important cases that we can no longer deliver to our patients. This year, I am also serving as one of the two Training Coordinators carrying the duties of recruiting, selecting, training, and evaluating the new cohort of volunteers. We face many challenges this year, but I am confident that we will overcome them.

Thanks to the knowledge I learned in the Berkeley Free Clinic Dental Section, I worked at two different dental offices as a full-scope dental assistant during this summer. It was a very challenging experience for me and now I am even more prepared to bring back the skills I learn to our Free Clinic. I also took two fascinating courses in photography this summer. I had a long time interest in photography and decided that I need to learn more about it. I took both the history of photography and photography art practice. I have enjoyed my summer and I am now ready for my senior year of college, which will begin next week.

I want to express my deepest appreciation to all Rotarians, who provided me this scholarship to support me through my college career. I will not be able to carry out the same level of services mentioned above without your generous help. Your scholarship not only provided me financial support, more importantly, but it also reminds me of the good spirit of giving back to the community. I will always remember to Service Above Self. I believe through my hard work, with my strong passion for healthcare, I will make this world a better place.

FOOD TO HELP BRIGHTEN THE HOLIDAYS BY LAUREN SCHLAU







Huge Gift Is a Building Block for Salvation Army

Heading into Christmas, the Salvation Army Pasadena Tabernacle will be rejoicing for all to hear, and perhaps a little more exultantly this year.

That might seem odd during a pandemic year that has brought immense challenges and fear to the nonprofit and the hundreds of clients it serves, but the Tabernacle recently received a year-end gift that will help change the course of its history by providing housing for the homeless and more than double the number of people and families it can serve at its Walnut Street campus.

Local philanthropists John and Diane Mullin have gifted \$5.65 million to the Salvation Army's capital campaign, which now has garnered enough to of-

Salvation Army Helping Homeless With New Apartments

The Salvation Army gave out 4 million meals just from April-June 2020 during the height of the quarantine. And they continue to support the community's food insecurity. The need in Pasadena alone has "tripled" since the start of the pandemic.

The Salvation Army in Pasadena is working on an exciting project – The

The Salvation Army has been on the frontlines during the global pandemic, providing food, shelter, rental assistance, and other services to those in the most need.

an exciting project – The Salvation Army Diane and John Mullin Hope Center! The Salvation Army Pasadena Diane and John Mullin Hope Center will provide 66 formerly homeless single adults from the Pasadena area with a permanent place to call home

in rent-subsidized studio apartments in a modern, newly constructed building located at 1000 E. Walnut St. in Pasadena. The Hope

Center will be a safe and welcoming space for its residents, with comprehensive case management, addiction recovery and counseling programs, and strong links to partner service providers in the community that will bolster each resident for long-term permanent housing



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success.

The extensive supportive services provided to residents of the Pasadena Hope Center will capitalize on the Salvation Army's vast experience in other programs and utilize research-based best practices, with the goal of assisting residents to remain sober, maintain

housing, improve quality of life, and increase their ability to live independently. Services will center around clientcentered case management, including substance abuse services and education; counseling and advocacy; life skills training; financial counseling; connections to community supports, including employment, education, legal services, and domestic violence support; and social and recreational activities. A great number of residents will struggle with substance use disorders; therefore the Salvation Army will incorporate ongoing recovery supports into Hope Center programming. Some Case Managers at the Hope Center will be certified addiction

> counselors, and will be available to provide counseling, education, assessment, and referrals around substance abuse and recovery to residents with a history of substance abuse, including to Medicaid-funded licensed outpatient treatment providers. Peer-led recovery group meetings, including AA, will be established on-site at Hope Center Apartments several times per week.

The first floor of the Hope

Center will include the needed social services that our community continues to rely upon, including the Client Choic Food Pantry, counseling, community referrals, case management, education opportunities and school partnerships.

Recently, a generous local couple, Ju and Diane Mullin, provide a \$150,000 challenge grant, to inspire others to support the Hope Center and help us raise the remaining \$300,000 we need finalize the funding for this \$37 million project!
