

In schools, our homes, and the media, we pay respect to the more than 400 years of history, culture, advancement and achievement of America's citizens and ancestors of the African Diaspora. As I reflect on the countless narratives that comprise our Nation's rich, but sometimes turbulent history, I am left with two words that embody the beloved "American Dream" we all share. Courage and Hope.

The courage of Harriet Tubman, the dream of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the hope of former President Barack Obama, remind us of our own power to create the world we wish to be a part of. As former First Lady Michelle Obama proclaimed, "history has shown us that courage can be contagious, and hope can take on a life of its own."

A spark of courage and hope can create ripples felt for generations to come. Shortly after being freed from slavery, Jane Oliver acquired a vast amount of land in Arkansas. This was uncommon for any woman at the time, particularly one born into slavery. Jane Oliver had both the courage and hope to overcome the circumstances she was born into, turning her dream into reality, and creating an inspiring legacy for her descendants.

I am the great-great granddaughter of Jane Oliver. A portion of my youth was spent sitting in courtrooms watching my non-lawyer mother represent Jane Oliver's Estate in an eminent domain action against the University of Arkansas, Pine Bluff. In those early moments of my life, I had not yet fathomed that I would later fill myself with the courage and hope of my ancestor by becoming the first attorney in my family. Remembering the words of Maya Angelou's "Still I Rise," I am reminded that, like many who came before me "I am the dream and the hope of a slave."

Reflecting on the progress we have made toward a reality where the "American Dream" belongs to all those who wish to dream it, I cannot help but sing a song that, while honoring our past, is full of hope for our future. We need not look further than LA5 to realize the difference we have made toward creating a world where dreams are transmuted into reality. May we, united as one, continue embodying the courage and hope of the "American Dream" for generations to come.



MYANMAR STATUS REPORT

Dear LA5 Rotarians,

We hope everyone is doing well, keeping safe and staying healthy. We all want 2021 to go better than the previous year and it seems to be a "steady as she goes" course ahead. I know a few of us have received the vaccine and hope everyone will be able to follow suit very soon.


The Myanmar Committee wanted to give everyone an update on the recent activities in Myanmar at the end of January. Here is what we know:

- The National League for Democracy (NLD) won 83% of the Hluttaw's (Parliament) available electoral seat.
- The Military (Tatmadaw) refused to accept the results of the vote and took control of the country.
- State Counselor Mme. Aung San Suu Kyi, President U Win Myint, as well as most of the Cabinet Ministers were detained to house arrest from February 1st.
- The Tatmadaw has announced one year of provisional martial law and named a Governing Council to run the government for that time.

Last year, our U.S. Government had announced financial and travel sanctions on the generals who engineered the coup because of military atrocities of the past. We do not believe they will render any further sanctions on Myanmar at this time. It is important for you to know that, under long-sustained U.S. law, Humanitarian Aid is exempted from any kind of sanction.

Through J.T. Warring's background and commitment for the last 16 years, even during the years of military occupation from 2005-11, we are monitoring the situation in Myanmar with our dedicated on the ground-based team. We are still intending to complete our 2021 Build Season and see no present reason we will not be unable to do so. There are several factors that guide our endeavors to complete our humanitarian mission. First, the re-opening of the airports and second, the recommencing of Myanmar Visa issuance. The other factor is Myanmar settling into a semblance of normalcy within 30-60 days. We are monitoring all these factors carefully.

We will certainly keep the club informed of our activities. We hope to be able to get JT in the country by mid-April. Should we have to push our arrival to the beginning of May, we are still able to complete our projects by late June.

One of the many reasons that drive the Myanmar Committee forward is the fact that JT Warring met with Mme. Aung San Suu Kyi four times during 2011 to 2014. She asked JT if Rotary could be a catalyst to provide clean water systems to the local Villagers in her Country. His answer was then and is now a firm "yes."

JT is participating in a conference call with U.S. Ambassador of Myanmar, Thomas Vajda, this week.



Rotary ramps up COVID-19 vaccination efforts

Rotary clubs around the world are mobilizing in their communities to support the introduction and delivery of COVID-19 vaccinations. Rotary leaders are urging members to connect with their local health agencies to determine how Rotary can support COVID-19 vaccine efforts.

Rotary has decades of experience in supporting the distribution of polio vaccines as well as highlighting their power and efficacy, which is a critical reason why polio is on the brink of eradication. It's this expertise, along with strategic partnerships and innovation, that Rotary members can tap into to protect communities from COVID-19.

Back-up for health officials

Rotary International President Holger Knaack and Foundation Trustee Chair K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran have called on Rotary members to take action on a number of levels. Rotary members in North Carolina, USA, quickly organized to offer assistance to health officials. District leaders contacted the state's secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to strategize support efforts.

The six district governors in North Carolina joined the state's health department in conducting **a webinar**, open to the more than 12,200 Rotary members in North Carolina, to provide information about the available COVID-19 vaccines, how they will be distributed, and answer their questions so they can serve as role models and instill confidence in the vaccines in their community.

"Rotarians are leaders who are looked upon for guidance, and the more information and opportunity to share ideas with health officials, the better," said Dawn Rochelle, governor of Rotary district 7730 (North Carolina). Members volunteered at local vaccination sites across the state to help health officials with logistics including data entry, crowd control, and check-ins. Members also provide health workers and volunteers with food and beverages. In addition, the districts provided the state health department with a spreadsheet that included a Rotary member contact for each of the 100 counties in North Carolina.

Nancy Barbee and Rochelle, past governors of the same district, volunteered together during National Immunization Days in India. It's those experiences with mass immunization for polio that helped them identify specific needs for how members can help support COVID-19 vaccinations.

"The polio eradication initiative gives a blueprint that provides strategy that is effective in any community," says Rochelle, who took part in two polio immunization drives in India. "Governments take the lead on immunizations there and here in the U.S., but what's critical to the success is the additional layer of support Rotarians bring. We are here to back-up the frontline workers with anything they need. It's amazing to see the response of North Carolina Rotarians."

New joint COVID-19 taskforce gives direction to clubs

At a meeting in December, the Rotary International Board of Directors and Rotary Foundation Trustees created a joint taskforce that will help guide upcoming efforts to distribute the COVID-19 vaccines and advocate for people to get vaccinated. The newly formed group will also share information promoting vaccine acceptance, and encourage service projects to stop the spread of the disease, such as social distancing, wearing masks, and washing hands frequently.


Clubs: Share your COVID-19 efforts on Rotary Showcase.

In a joint letter to district leaders, Knaack and Ravindran said members have a successful history of getting things done when help is needed. "Through the hundreds of global grants and projects, Rotary members have demonstrated what we can accomplish to raise awareness, deliver critical personal protection equipment, and provide support to frontline health workers," they said in the letter.

The two Rotary leaders called particular attention to the importance of one specific call to action: combatting vaccine hesitancy. "Help us combat the powerful, growing force of vaccine resistance and misinformation. Our advocacy in our communities will be critical – we need to spread the message about the power of vaccines to save lives," they urged.

Other ways clubs can mobilize around COVID-19 vaccine introduction and delivery at the local level include community education, ensuring equitable distribution of the vaccine, helping stop the continued spread of the disease, and aiding local health authorities to get prepared for mass vaccinations.

The infrastructure created by Rotary and its Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) partners is already supporting efforts to combat COVID-19. The GPEI recently announced that it is ready to support the rollout of COVID-19 vaccines.
